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## NAME TEAM AND BOOK

### 120 STUDENTS REGISTER FOR SPRING TERM

It was announced recently that 120 students have registered for the spring term. Eighty-two are first year students and 38 second year.

So far three new students have registered. Part time are Charles Lewis of Lake Ann, and John Simone of Traverse City. Lynn Smith, Suttons Bay, is a full time transfer student from Central Michigan, where he attended for 1 semester.

### SUMMER COURSES SLATED

Northwestern Michigan College will offer its first summer school courses in 1953, beginning June 22, and continuing until July 31. The classes, possibly held on the new campus, will consist of both NMC courses and Michigan State Extension courses.

These opportunities are offered for high school students, high school graduates and college students wishing to earn undergraduate or graduate credit.

The main office requests that enrollment for the summer be completed as soon as possible, and those planning to enroll in the courses offered by Michigan State College make this known to the office before April 15.

Regular tuition for classes offered by NMC is \$4.00 per credit hour. Matriculation fee for new NMC students is \$5.00; typewriting fee, \$2.00 and Office Machines, \$4.00. (cont. page 3)

However, the Publications Inc. staff and the editorial board of judges reserves the right to select the best names submitted or to reject all entries as unfit and substitute a pair of proper tags "to fit the growing tradition of NMC."

The contest begins at this publication date and ends promptly two weeks later, April 17.

"Early entries will have a better chance in the competition," said publications spokesman in urging quick action for a successful close.
