# TANIS RESIGNS

## STUDENT UNION TO BE BUILT THIS SUMMER

Word was released today that the beautiful new NMC union building, Tomahawk Inn, will be built this summer. Funds for the new building were contributed yesterday in an impressive ceremony in the Rose Arbor directly in front of the college building. These funds have been contributed by a combine of prominent Maryland businessmen headed by Mr. James DeLapa, a noted NMC booster.

Plans for the new building have been drawn by Frank Lloyd Wright, noted architect. The focal point of the new building will be the beautifully painted cocktail lounge which will overlook the Bay, a fact made possible by the recent canal dug from East Bay to West Bay. This project, an enterprise of the Wunsch Farms, resulted in the desire of the noted orchardist to make the Old Mission Peninsula, which he recently purchased, into an island.

The dining hall of the union, directed by maitre d'hotel Monsieur Pierre Thompson Quelquechose, will specialize in broiled lobster. M. Quelquechose is expected to journey to Paris this sum-

## NEW DIRECTOR NAMED

Preston N. Tanis, director of the college since its beginning, last night in a statement to the Associated Press announced his resignation from NMC to accept a position as the President of Harvard University. Tanis, obviously shaken as he spoke, said, "It is with great regret that I leave NMC. We have come a long way together but just recently I've felt a lack of challenge. Therefore when representatives of Harvard approached with the alarming news that the Harvard endowment has been reduced to \$350 million, I felt I couldn't refuse."

Immediately after Tanis' resignation, a flood of applications came to the college. In an all night meeting, college administrative authorities chose Harlan Hatcher, former president of the University of Michigan, as Director of NMC. Hatcher was chosen principally because of his offer to bring the entire staff of the U. of M. to NMC. The news was greeted jubilantly at Ann Arbor where staff members have for some time been trying to secure positions at NMC.

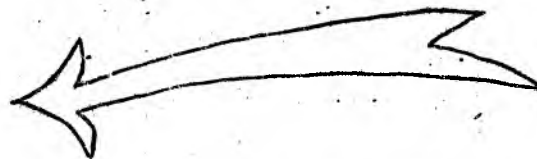
